Overview

Software Installation

Windows:

Installation will typically begin automatically when you insert the disc. If it doesn't:

1. Press the Windows key () + "E."
2. Right-click on CD/DVD-ROM drive icon and select "Open."
3. Double-click on "Setup.exe" to begin the installation process.
4. Follow the instructions that appear on your screen.

To run the software: Double click the shortcut on your Desktop or click the icon the Start Menu (Start Screen on Windows 8). Follow the prompts to enter your serial number, register your software, and to copy the media from the disc to your hard drive so you can run the software without the disc in the computer.

Mac OS X:

1. Insert the disc. Double-click the disc icon that appears on your desktop.
2. Drag the application icon in the newly opened window and release it on the Applications folder icon in the same window. This action copies the application to your Mac's Applications folder.

To run the software: Double click the program icon in the Applications folder to run the program. (You may wish to drag the application icon to your Dock for quicker access.) Follow the prompts to enter your serial number, register your software, and to copy the media from the disc to your hard drive so you can run the software without the disc in the computer.

Features of *eMedia Guitar Method*

Descriptions of these features can also be found in the software Appendix.

Interactive Icons

- The Video button plays video related to the lesson. (The horizontal scroll bar for the video can be held by the pointer and moved back and forth to repeat the viewing of certain parts of a video.)
- The Audio button plays a live-recorded example.
- The Accompaniment button plays a backing track.
- The Comment button plays instructor's spoken comment related to the lessons, such as playing tips and historical references connected to songs.
- The chord charts are also interactive buttons. Click on them to hear the chord strummed on a guitar.
- The Instant Feedback and Performance Evaluation buttons enable the highlighting of notes or chords played by the students as well as scoring system. For interactive feedback to work, the computer must be able to hear the student playing guitar without too much background noise.*
- The MIDI Tempo Slider allows the student to alter the tempo of the song or exercise using MIDI tracks. Click the dot to return to the default tempo and live-recorded audio.

* A music lab will probably have too much background noise for accurate interactive feedback through a standard microphone. If you want to take advantage of interactive feedback in a lab setting, we recommended that students use an electric guitar or an acoustic guitar with a pickup and connect the output of the pickup to the computer through an audio interface that is optimized for guitar.

Progress Tracking

- Allows one to review the students' progress through the Method on a particular computer and check the highest scores for Performance Evaluation at a glance. It can also be printed and erased.

Music Tracking

- Highlights display on screen as the music plays to guide the student in reading the notation.
- This feature can be disabled using the “Music Tracking” item under the Options menu.
- The first time the student arrives at a screen with music notation (or if the Metronome tool is launched first), a Synchronization window is presented for calibration of sound and visual synchronization. To find this again, open the Preferences window (Guitar Method menu on Mac, Help menu on Windows) and click the Synchronization button.

Animated Fretboard

- Shows students where to put their fingers as the music plays.
- Students can double-click on a specific note or chord and the Animated Fretboard will show where this note or chord is located on the fretboard.
- Students can move the Animated Fretboard to any location by clicking and dragging the top bar, and it can be resized by clicking and dragging the lower right corner of the window.
- Students can flip the Animated Fretboard from left-to-right or upside-down in case they are left-handed or prefer a mirror view.
- The Animated Fretboard also features custom fingerboard skins so students can play their favorite guitar while working through the lessons.

Song Highlighting and Looping

- Allows students to select specific sections of music for repeated playback and to loop challenging parts of any exercise. Students can repeat and drill problem spots over and over. Looping should be utilized as much as possible.
- Additional details can be found on Appendix screen A5.

MIDI Tempo Slider

- Allows students to slow down or speed up any exercise to match their skill level.
- Those who are not challenged may wish to increase the tempo.

Chord Charts

- Display the correct fingering for chords used in the song or exercise.
- Click the charts to hear the chord played on a guitar.

Notation vs. Tablature

- A notation default setting for selected lessons can be set to either “Tablature” or “Notation” using the Options menu item.

Automatic Tuner

- Offers an easy-to-use interface for standard tuning.
- Students should regularly check their tuning.
- This feature requires a microphone or a direct connection from the guitar to the computer.

Metronome

- Offers an easy way to practice any song or exercise at a variety of tempos.

Recorder

- Students can record themselves to check on their playing.
- The teacher can have students record their playing as homework to be turned in on a disk or sent to the teacher by email.

Chord Dictionary

- This can be used for composition and as a quick reference. It shows common voicings for over 250 chords.

Note and Finger Tracker

- Students can see individual notes they are playing on a simulated fretboard and also on staff notation.
- This feature requires a microphone or a direct connection from the guitar to the computer.

Print Screen

- Teachers and students can print almost any screen. Copyrighted songs listed in the credits cannot be printed. Credits can be found in the Help menu (Windows) or the Guitar Method menu (Mac).

Suggested Learning Strategy for Students

The many interactive features can be combined to enhance learning. Here is a helpful strategy you can present to your students. It is assumed that the students are using headphones and have a microphone or direct connection between their guitar and computer.

Directions for students:

- Absorb the lesson material on screen. Read the text, watch any videos, and listen to any audio comments.
- Click the audio button to hear the exercise or song in its entirety before playing anything. Keep your eyes on the music notation.
- Play the audio again, and this time watch the Animated Fretboard, taking note of the suggested fingering.
- Check your fingering. Turn on Instant Feedback (the ear icon button). Double-click a chord name in the notation to bring up the Animated Fretboard showing the fingering. Place your fingers to match and strum. The name will light up green to confirm you played it correctly. You can check all the chords in the song or exercise this way before you start playing the song.
- When you are ready to play along with the audio, click the audio button with Instant Feedback engaged. This begins Performance Evaluation. Play along with the song you hear in your headphones. When the song is finished, *Guitar Method* will show you how you did and present a score. You can repeat this step as often as you like and *Guitar Method* will retain your best score. You can use this with the standard audio or with the Jam Track. It also works with the variable-speed MIDI tracks so you can slow it down as needed.
- Another option for Performance Evaluation is Silent Mode. To engage Silent Mode, click the button in the upper right corner of the screen. You will hear a count off followed by a click track only. Play along with the click track just the same as you would play along with the song. Note that some of the songs will include a few beats extra between chord changes to give you time to switch your fingering.

Tip: To address stumbling blocks, students can highlight a range from two notes to an entire phrase and slow the tempo down using the Tempo Slider. They can gradually speed up the tempo as they become more proficient. Click on the dot to resume normal audio playback.

Sample 46-Day Lesson Plan

Computer-Assisted Guitar Class for Beginning Guitarists *Learning eMedia Guitar Method*

- Numbers in brackets (e.g., [X]) are listed after each melody and chord exercise or lesson marking how many days they have been covered. This does not apply to numbers after quizzes.
- Unless they are singing, students should always quietly verbalize the note names while they are studying individually or as a group.
- Make sure everyone has a guitar.
- Make sure software is properly loaded.
- Set the audio at a comfortable volume setting.
- Make sure headphones are working.
- Tune guitars.
- Check student's body and hand position. This is something the teacher should check on a daily basis.
- When playing, students should use the tips of their fingers to fret the notes and "anchor" the left-hand thumb behind the neck.
- Make sure students do not press on the string over the fret. This will cause buzzing.
- Make sure students press down hard enough to create a clear tone.
- Music labs can be noisy, so to take advantage of the Instant Feedback features of *eMedia Guitar Method*, it's most effective to use either connected electric guitars or acoustic guitars with pickups instead of microphones. There are numerous ways to connect the patch cord from one of these guitars to your computer.

Daily Lesson Plan

Day 1

Curriculum Enhancement Suggestions

- Teachers should go through their existing curriculum and connect together topics that are found in *eMedia Guitar Method* with their lesson plan. This can be done by reviewing the exercise descriptions found on pages 11-17.
- Teachers can also use other eMedia software titles to enhance or expand upon a particular discussion.
- Teachers can use email to send students their graded assignments or any of the documents suggested below.
- The teacher can load supplementary topics on each student's computer, or the documents can be printed and handed out.
- Topics authored by the teacher could include:
 - Additional songs written by the teacher that tie into the curriculum
 - Additional assignments, quizzes, tests
 - Composition exercises
 - Improvisation exercises
- *eMedia Music Theory Tutor* software allows teachers the ability to expand further on topics discussed in *eMedia Guitar Method*.
- If no theory software is available, then teachers can create documents that cover scales, chord progressions, and two- to four- part harmony pieces.
- Chord progressions can be analyzed on any of the songs in the curriculum.
- Ability to print out songs
 - When teachers do not have computers in the classroom, then it is suggested that the teacher print out the screens. These print-outs allow teachers to use hard copies of the lessons for classroom use. This is especially helpful for students who do not have computers at home.
- Audio examples of songs
 - Additional songs can be heard by playing compact discs on the computer. This can expand the topic of "styles."
 - Students can bring in their own music.
 - Some songs in *Guitar Method* may not be in the vocal range of a particular student or group of students. This occurs on only a few songs. Encourage the students to sing when they can, dropping out and rejoining as needed.

- Students and teachers can grab the scroll bar on the video player and repeat sections of the video.

Classroom activity ideas:

Introduce the Afro-Cuban Clave Rhythm

- Apply the “clave” rhythmic phrase to these songs: La Bamba, When the Saints Go Marching In, Working on the Railroad, Uncle John’s Band.
- Discuss the importance of “phrase” and how it is created through “tension and release.”
- Have students clap the clave rhythm.
- Show how clave fits into the songs listed above.
- Have half the class sing and play guitar while the other half of the class claps clave and sings.

5. Choral group sings the songs
